Digital Switchover Migration

You will be aware that digital switchover – the move from analogue to digital terrestrial television in the UK – started during November 2007. This process will continue region by region and will be completed in 2012. At the same time, the spectrum cleared of broadcasting will be released for new uses through our Digital Dividend Review (DDR). One of the consequences of these developments is that the configuration of spectrum currently available for Programme Making and Special Events (PMSE) use in UHF Bands IV and V (470-854 MHz) will change.

We published a statement and information in January 2008¹ which described the frequencies likely to be available for PMSE after switchover has taken place. We also committed to contacting individual licensees to inform them when switchover will take place in their region and to indicate which frequencies are likely to be available for use afterwards.


The table at the end of this letter provides further information based on your location of use. You should note that some of the frequencies identified could be identified for separate award under the DDR, and so availability would not be guaranteed for PMSE.

We will consult on all such proposals in the spring and will publish a statement during the Autumn of 2008. PMSE users are advised to bear this in mind when making decisions on equipment use. Where users believe that their current equipment will not be able to tune into available channels after DSO, they should contact their equipment supplier in the first instance. It may be possible to retune or modify equipment to operate in the new frequencies. All PMSE users are advised to check the availability of spectrum with JFMG before retuning, modifying or replacing equipment.

We will contact you again when our statement has been published and once the configuration of spectrum has been determined to inform you which frequencies will be available to you for PMSE use. At this point we would expect that frequencies marked 'likely to be available' in this letter will be marked as either 'not available' or 'available'.

Where we have marked availability as 'Not available', you will no longer be able to use this frequency after switchover and should check our on-line tool at www.jfmg.co.uk for alternatives. You may wish to note that changes to access before switchover to channels 61 and 62, which are marked as not available for PMSE after switchover, may be proposed in Ofcom's consultation on the future use of these channels. An announcement on this will be made later in 2008.

Where we have marked availability as 'Likely to be available', these frequencies are likely to be available after switchover, but since some of these frequencies could be identified for separate award under the DDR, availability cannot be guaranteed for PMSE. Ofcom will consult on all such proposals in Spring 2008 and will publish a statement during the Autumn of 2008.
